First use of a semicolon...

It was dark. Silence enveloped them.

It was dark; silence enveloped them.

Join two closely linked independent clauses.

Second use of a semicolon...

Some children believe in the Tooth Fairy, whereas other children do not.

Some children believe in the Tooth Fairy; other children do not.

In place of a conjunction to join two independent clauses

First use of a colon...

He was soaked through to his skin. The rain was relentless.

He was soaked through to his skin: the rain was relentless.

To join two independent clauses when the second provides clarity for the first clause.

Second use of a colon...

Not wanting to go hungry, the children quickly grabbed some supplies bread, apples, crisps and some chocolate bars.

Not wanting to go hungry, the children quickly grabbed some supplies: bread, apples, crisps and some chocolate bars.

Introduce a list.

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Semi-colons can be used to separate items in a complex list.

The different colours are different items in the lists above.
