Things to consider for your story:



Keep your inverted commas at the beginning and the end of the words being spoken.

New Speaker, New Line

Start a new line whenever someone new speaks.

Capital Letter

Begin what is spoken with a capital letter!

"What an amazing day!" he announced.

Different Names

Inverted Commas are also called: Speech Marks Quotation Marks

Commas

Remember to add commas.

Punctuation

Make sure your speech is correctly punctuated!

In Chapter 9, Gunnar gets to know some townspeople, including Thorkel, who seems to like Gunnar. He tells Gunnar that Rurik used to be a warrior in the Greek Emperor's guard, just like Bjorn's father.

In Chapter 10, Gunnar gets some revenge on Gawk, Ivor and Njil, and asks Rurik about his past as a warrior. He finds out that Rurik fought much later than Bjorn, so they didn't know each other. Gunnar tells Rurik his story so far.

In Chapter 11, Gunnar finds out a bit more about the Land of Ice and Fire. Rurik and Gunnar get into some trouble with two men called Ari and Starkad, and Starkad (Orm's son) is killed. Ari holds Gunnar and Rurik at sword-point, and decide to take them to Orm.

Will he find his father in Valhalla?




